### **Digital Timeline Instructions**

Here's how to create a digital timeline with your class. Always be sure to closely monitor student use of the Internet.

### Set up a framework for your timeline before class:

- 1. Before class, visit www.timerime.com.
- 2. Click on "Login or Register" at the top.
- 3. Follow the prompts at the left to register and create an account. Your students will use the same log-in information when they access the timeline.
- 4. Activate your account by clicking the link that is e-mailed to you by TimeRime.
- 5. Select "Make a New Timeline."
- 6. Follow the prompts to create and name your new timeline. Make sure to select this timeline as "Private" at the bottom.
- 7. Next you will be asked to create an event on the timeline. Fill in the title and the date range for the first event. Click "save and new" to enter information for subsequent events. Once you've entered the titles and dates for all the events, you're ready for your students to fill in the details.

### Create the timeline with your students:

- 1. Visit www.timerime.com.
- 2. Click on "Login or Register" at the top.
- 3. Enter your log-in information. You will be taken to your class's personal home page.
- 4. You will see your timeline listed on the left. Select "edit" to add or make changes to it.
- 5. Click on "add item" to add events to your timeline. Or click on a timeline entry and then click "edit" to add text, pictures, videos, music, and more. For example, students could add footage of David Ben-Gurion reading Israel's Declaration of Independence. Many of the resources are available through Modern Israel Online, which can be downloaded from www.behrmanhouse.com/EMI.

Digital Timeline Instructions, continued

### **Upload Photographs:**

- 1. To upload a photo to your timeline, you must first download it to your computer. Choose a photo, right-click on it and select "Save Picture As." Select "Desktop" as the location to save the photo.
- 2. In the edit screen for your TimeRime timeline entry, select "Add Image." Then select "Upload one file" at the top of the Image Manager pop-up box. Then select "Browse" to find your picture and click "upload."
- 3. You should now see your photo in the Image Manager pop-up box. Click on the small arrow in the corner of the photo and choose "Insert". Your photo will now appear in the timeline.

### **Embed a Video From YouTube:**

- 1. First, find the video you would like to embed. Below the video, select "Embed." then highlight and copy the text of the code.
- 2. In the edit screen for your timeline entry, select the YouTube Icon. Paste the code into the box and select "Insert."
- 3. Now if you click on your entry in the timeline, you'll see the video in the box below.

### Embed your timeline into a Website or Wikispace:

- 1. When the timeline is complete, click on the icon at the top that looks like a chain.
- 2. Use the link shown to embed your timeline into a website.
