In 1954, about six years after Israel became an independent state, the government issued the stamp pictured here. It was issued as a fall holiday stamp and says “Happy Holidays” in Hebrew.

- What part of the scouts’ story is depicted on the stamp?
- Why do you think the Israeli government chose to have a stamp designed with this image?
- How does this stamp celebrate the richness and promise of the new State of Israel?
- Imagine you are a young person living in Israel in 1954. How might you feel when you see this stamp?
- How can one picture or symbol, like the one on the stamp, tell an important story or convey a deep feeling?
